Gerald C. Horne, Ph.D., a Professor of History at the University of North Carolina, in the undergraduate Joint Appointments with Communications Studies the African and Afro-American Studies graduate program, will make his first presentation to the Forum on January 21, 2006 titled "Race and Culture."

A recipient of a Master of Arts degree (1978) and Ph.D. in 1982 from Columbia University, he has written four books since 1995. His first publication, *Fire This Time: The Watts Uprising and the 1960s* was a finalist for the American Sociological Association's Robert Park Award in 1996.

Other publications include *Race Woman: The Lives of Shirley Graham Du Bois*, *Class Struggle in Hollywood: Moguls, Mobsters, Stars, Reds and Trade Unionists, 1930-1850* and *From the Barrel of the Gun: The U. S. and the War Against Zimbabwe, 1965-1980*. His present research projects include "Black Labor at Sea: Ferdinand Smith, from the National Maritime Union to the Communist Party to Jamaica," "Race War! White Supremacy Vs. Blacks and Asians in the Japanese Attack on Hong Kong and the British Empire, 1930-1950" and "Black and Brown: African-Americans and the Mexican Revolution, 1910-20."
